**Modern Conflicts, Warfare, and Dictatorships:** The Gulf Wars, Middle Eastern dictatorships, the Arab Spring, Ba'athism, Terrorism, Islamic State, the War over the Falklands, Afghanistan, wars in Africa, Turkmenistan, Transnistria, Belarus, the conflict in Ukraine, militaria and historical objects of contemporary conflicts and dictatorship

All work sent for consideration must be entirely original and not plagiarized or copied from other sources. We do not accept work that has been published previously. All sources used must be cited. You may use MLA, APA, or Chicago style. Any images or graphics you would like us to use for your work must be your own, used with permission from the owner, or public domain. No copy-protected material of any kind will be used unless a permit of use has been granted to the Regimes Museum by the owner. A peer-review process is in place for all submissions. Not all submissions will be accepted for publication.

## 1. Author Information

- a. Complete contact information for yourself and any co-authors or co-editors. Include name(s), affiliation(s), phone number(s), and email address(es).
  - i. For edited collections, please provide only names/affiliations for each contributor.
- b. A short biography and full CV for each author/editor.
- c. Social media, websites, blogs, and any other media you use to promote your work.

## 2. Proposed Title/Subtitle

- 4. Brief Description of Project's Scope and Element
  - a. What makes your project distinctive?
  - b. What are the particular benefits offered by its content, scope, organization, etc.?
  - c. What needs does it aim to satisfy?
  - d. What is the expected length (word count)?
  - e. When do you realistically propose to deliver a final typescript?
- 5. Additional Information (please include details)
  - a. Have you published any of the material included in the manuscript previously?
  - b. Do you plan to include any third-party material requiring permission (e.g. tables, figures, illustrations, photographs, epigraphs)? If so, provide details.
    - i. In general, RM Press recommends that you keep the inclusion of third-party material to a minimum, as seeking permission from copyright holders can be very time-consuming. If you cannot avoid including such material, it will be your responsibility to obtain permission to use the material in print and online.
  - c. Will the article include interviews carried out by you or your contributors?
  - d. Is the article based on your PhD research? If yes, is your thesis available electronically anywhere (e.g. an institutional repository)?
  - e. If your article stems from a specific research project, please provide details of the project and the relevant funding bodies below.
  - f. Does the project require any illustration? If so, how many?
  - g. Please provide names and affiliations of 3-5 academics in your area who might be well-positioned to evaluate the project and offer feedback. Note that we may not necessarily use these suggestions.
